Triends. My life is more beautiful because of them.

I have enjoyed great friendships throughout my life. During childhood I was blessed with bosom companions. In college and post-graduate work, friends were a nurturing community and a vital source of help and pleasure. Through adulthood, friends have been wise counselors, my emotional support, and trustworthy company. My tenure at Village Church has been especially rich because of the friendships I've been blessed with. Whether they're next door or a thousand miles away, connection with friends remains a lifeline and spiritual anchor.

Friends have been there for me when I needed a helping hand. Through hard times and good, they have remained at my side.



Friends listened when I needed to talk, and they've talked when I needed direction. With friends, I've laughed heartily and had loads of fun. With some I've cried. Good friends are sensitive to my hills and valleys. They care greatly. Sometimes that meant space. Other times it meant being close, even a sympathetic embrace. Good friends have lasted through differences, apologies, and forgiveness. Dr. Seuss described friendship memorably: "To the world you may be just one person, but to one person you may be the world."

In John fifteen, Jesus uses a powerful metaphor about us and Him. "I am the vine, you are the branches" (verse 5). The imagery is reminiscent of the bond God invited Israel to enjoy as His covenant people. In effect, Jesus was reapplying that metaphor to us. He



is the conduit through which the blessings to Abraham become ours: rest, peace, protection, salvation. Everything promised to Abraham and his descendants is now ours in Jesus. Christ is the source of life, power, and wholeness for believers. "Abide in Me, and I in you" (John 15:4).

Then He says something startling. He calls us friends. Not servants. Not students. Not acquaintances. Friends. Imagine that! You are, I am, a friend of God.

Our union with Him, Jesus says, is not to be confused with a servant/master role. "I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business" (John 15:15). We know our Master's business. Jesus came to tell us. It's documented in His word and accessible to all. We know His hopes, dreams, and plans for us and our world. He's given us the keys to His Kingdom. Servants aren't privy to such details. We

are . . . because we are His friends. "I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you" (John 15:15).

In the entire Old Testament, there is only one person who is called a "friend of God" (2 Chronicles 20:7; Isaiah 41:8; James 2:23). That was Abraham. Moses was close.



He talked with God as with a friend (Exodus 33:11). But Abraham was closer. To this friend, God promised, "Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield, your exceedingly great reward" (Genesis 15;1b NKJV).



served on a jury a few years ago. After the evidence and

defense were presented, we jurors were shown to a jury deliberation room. We discussed the case for 3 days before we came to the unanimous decision that the defendant was guilty. Then the judge stated that

the sentencing would be on September 15, two months away. I was puzzled why he scheduled such a delay until I heard that the judge would discuss the case with the defense attorney and prosecutor before deciding the sentence.

I think of the decisions I impulsively made when my little plaintiffs had committed crimes, such as teasing younger siblings to the point of tears. Too often I neglected asking about their motives and talking about the effects of their misbehavior. I usually didn't pray about it by myself or with them. Sometimes my response was unduly harsh because of how annoyed I felt. How we correct wrong attitudes and behaviors really matters. It's helpful for parents to talk things over together when dealing with



bigger problems. Rash decisions are often not good. Undue harshness builds resentment and fear in children.

Waiting to hear the consequence is thoughtprovoking for the child. There are consequences



that are related to wrongs, such as doing an extra chore when one neglected doing his assigned chore. After being rude, older kids can write about a time someone was unkind to them and how they felt, in addition to doing something kind for the person they were rude to.



Jesus, thank you for the parenting information you've given us. We need it.

Anxiety and depression are common in our world, and no one needs to struggle alone. Mindfit, by the Voice of Prophecy, offers practical help and hope. There will be video presentations, group discussion of the video, community and connection. Useful for anyone living in this society. Bring a friend and come check it out!

The Persevering Wasp

ne beautiful sunny day I was edging the lawn while my son Brent mowed. I stepped on the edging tool, cutting straight down into the soil, then smoothed the soil up onto the bed making a flat bottom and then a rounded raised edge on the other side. About 5



feet ahead of me something at the edge of the lawn glittered in the sunlight. I stepped closer to see what it was.

It was a tiny black wasp about ³/₄ inch long, very thin and shiny black. Its body and wings glittered with colors of the



body and wings glittered with colors of the rainbow in the sunlight. She looked to be dancing with joy around an ugly greyish-white caterpillar. It was a bit longer than she was and 4 times as big around—thick and fat. I leaned closer to watch her. She was dragging it home,

probably for lunch for her babies. I wondered how far she was going. I hadn't cleaned the edge there. She was struggling to get around a big wood chip. I picked up another chip and proceeded to help by scraping out a smooth path before her. She danced with joy and tugged her heavy burden along—shoving and dragging it.

Brent came to see what I was doing and he predicted I would get stung. I said, "No, I won't. See how happy she is, and see her sparkling rainbow colors?" He shrugged and started mowing again.

She came right along the path I cleared for her. I wondered, did she know where she was going? How far? Was I distracting her

from her direction by making life too easy? Would she forget where she wanted to go? Sometimes the devil leads us astray by making it so easy we lose our way. She continued right along the path I made for her, making about 5 feet in 20 minutes. Probably would have been an hour without my help. Would she have given up? Was she now lost? She was still dancing and flicking her wings, sparkling like the rainbow.

Then she stopped. To rest? To get her bearings? What? I had cut the edge there 2 inches deep—3-4 times her height. She inspected the bank. No way could she possibly pull her heavy burden up that bank! After all her struggle was it a lost cause? She nudged the caterpillar close and

climbed on top of it. She still couldn't reach the top.

Sometimes have you found yourself in that situation? "Lord, I've worked so hard, I can't do this! Help me!" I wondered, "Do wasps pray?" I had to help her. I slid the chip of wood I was using to make a path into the soil under her and lifted very



carefully. She waited. I pushed the chip against the edge of the lawn. The lawn was cut short there, but it was still taller than her body. She got off the chip and dragged her burden off onto the grass. Now which way would she go? Did she know where she was? How good was her tiny GPS? She had turned west and now she tried to move forward through the thick spring grass. Was she going to go to the neighbor's yard about 60 feet away? This could



take all day! I looked around. How could I help? I spotted some flowers—irises with wide flat leaves. I broke off two leaves and laid them in line in front of her. She tugged the caterpillar aboard and pulled it down the long runway. She looked so happy. But was she going the right way?

I was too fascinated to stop, and she seemed to get more and more excited as the morning minutes quickly ticked by! I kept alternating the leaves in front of her. About 12 feet across the grass we came to the curved edge of the flowerbed again. Now there was a deep drop-off in front of her (equivalent to about 20 feet for you, if you are 5 feet tall). The iris leaf ended there and before I could get the other leaf across the great expanse of the flowerbed, she gave a big tug and pulled the critter over the edge. They tumbled together to the bottom of the ditch. I thought she was crushed by the fall, but she wiggled out from under and began the long, steep (for her) climb up the curved edge of the bed, ignoring her skinned knees.

I cleared her path straight ahead a little way at a time, hoping she would stop soon. Suddenly she flitted over the ground a few inches ahead. There she stopped and searched in a small circle. And there it was! A small hole—too small, I thought. She came back to the caterpillar and tugged it towards the hole. I cleared her way. She pulled it to the entrance. It didn't fit! She cleared it out a bit wider. Still not big enough, I thought. But she



went into the hole and tugged. Slowly it slipped inside. I thought it would plug the hole, but after a bit it plopped inside. Then she appeared at the entrance, came

out and did her happy jig just for me, I think. Then she turned around and began kicking the dirt into the hole with her back legs.

When she was finished she flew away. I marveled at the accuracy of her tiny GPS. So much harder than just flying there. So happy that she had accepted my help! (If she had been a big

yellow wasp I probably WOULD have gotten stung!) If you ever see a tiny black wasp, don't do it any harm. They do good for us.

I thought about how many times along the way I have been tempted to give up. How uncaring God seems when the way is so hard. Is He scraping the path before me sometimes, making elevators and green smooth paths for me and I don't think He



even sees or cares? I grumble instead of sparkle when He's been there all along clearing the way for me?

If you ever think the way is too hard, remember the little black wasp. God cares about the sparrow. Did He even send me to help the wasp—at least as a lesson for me? He says to watch



the ants too. I say we "hang in there." He'll make a way for us to get home! I'll see you there!

Kids: Remember to notice the little creatures God made. He cares for them and you are way more

important to Him than a tiny wasp. He's waiting to help you get home too.

Broccoli Cheese Soup

This recipe comes from the cookbook "Of These You May Freely Eat" by JoAnn Rachor. Naturally vegan and gluten-free, this soup is a delicious, nutritious comfort food, filling, healthy, and easy to put together. If you dare, drop in a pinch of cayenne pepper for added flavor and warmth.



Ingredients:

- 3 ½ cups water
- 1 2/3 cups raw, chopped carrots
- 1 ½ cups raw, chopped potatoes
- 1 cup onion, cut in chunks
- 1/2 cup raw cashews
- 1 ¾ tsp. salt
- 1 pound frozen broccoli or 4 cups fresh, chopped in small pieces

Instructions:

Lightly boil the carrots, potatoes and onion in the water until tender, 15-20 minutes. Put the cashews and salt in the blender along with part of the vegetables and part of the water from the saucepan. Blend for a full minute, until very smooth. Empty blender and blend smooth the rest of the ingredients from the pan. Cook the broccoli until tender. Combine all ingredients. Reheat and serve.



Variation: Sliced or chopped, cooked carrots and potatoes may be used for part or all of the broccoli. Or use other favorite vegetables, such as frozen, mixed vegetables, in place of the broccoli. Dear Village Voice readers,
